TRUTH BIBLE SCHOOL

It has always been a goal of our team to build up congregations and Christians that will be strong and faithful long after we depart the mission field. We recognize that one of the most effective ways of accomplishing that goal is to equip the Christians with a solid knowledge of the Bible. Taking our lead from Paul (Acts 19:9-10) and many other successful ministries, we decided to start the Truth Bible School in Port Vila this year. The school's purpose is assist Christians who are interested in learning and willing to put forth the effort to do so.

The school's first term began February 5 and lasted six weeks. We meet each Tuesday and Thursday evening from 6-8:30, with two courses taking place each evening. Throughout that first term, Aaron taught a course entitled, "How to the Study the Bible" during the first block (6-7), and Mike taught "The Scheme of Redemption" in the second (7:30-8:30). We had as many as 22 students at any one time, and 15 of them completed the courses in such a way to earn a grade.

The second term began this month, with Mike teaching the first block course of "The Old and New Covenants," and myself teaching a course on "The Church." Some students from the first term were not able to commit this time, but we were glad to welcome a few new students this term. We currently have 12 full-time students (7 men and 5 women) from four different congregations, and always have a few visitors for each class. In many instances, our visitors are unable to read or write, and thus simply "audit" the courses.

- Port Vila, Vanuatu -

I cannot accurately express my level of excitement about our work because of the school. Participation has been wonderful, and it really seems that the students are applying themselves and learning a lot. Preparing to teach the classes and transporting the students does take up a lot of time, but it is most certainly time well spent. The first teacher is responsible for transporting the students to class, and the second teacher is responsible for getting them home. This involves the teacher transporting some students (one is a 45 minute journey, one-way), a pre-arranged bus running a regular route, and an "island-transport" bringing one student from Epau Village, almost two hours one-way. Our team provides for the students' transportation to ensure that everyone is present at each class, and on time. The \$100 per week we spend on transportation is a great investment, no doubt!

Following a one-week break, Term 3 will begin June 24. Please join us in praying for these Bible students, that they will apply the lessons they are learning to their own lives, and that they will also be equipped to teach others.







VILA LADIES' FELLOWSHIP

During a recent trip to visit Claude and Rose Mary here in Vila, Rose Mary suggested to Shawnda that the

women begin a monthly fellowship in Port Vila. Her desire stemmed from the fact that she had begun taking classes at our Bible school this term, and had been reminded how important it is for women to grow spiritually (and how difficult that task can sometimes be, especially with family responsibilities).

A meeting was called on Sunday morning following our period of worship, and the ladies decided that they would begin meeting the last Saturday of every month at the church building, with a different person being in charge of the study time each month. In the past, the group has tried to meet monthly, but on a different day and in a different location each time. They hope that having a set date and location will help everyone schedule their time appropriately. Rose Mary volunteered to be in charge of the May meeting.

The first installment of this new setup took place on Saturday, May 31, with 5 local women and several kids (previous studies of this type saw only 1-2 local women in attendance). Shawnda reports that the time of fellowship, worship and study was enjoyed by all.

It was agreed that the ladies would try to go and visit other congregations on the island, and Etas Village was selected for June.

Maybel is in charge of this special outing, and Leikave volunteered to be in charge of the regular June study. We are all excited that so many different ladies are taking on a bit more responsibility, and hope that their time together each month will be encouraging and strengthening.









VEHICLE UPDATE

You may recall that we were able to sell our truck back in November. We were blessed to secure almost all of the funds we need to purchase a newer one during our latest furlough trip to the States, but are still in need of a few thousand dollars for this purchase (so please contact us if you are able to help). We are especially grateful to the congregations at 29th & Yale and Eastside for their generous special contributions.

Buying a used vehicle in Vanuatu is considerably different from the shopping experience we're used to the States. Perhaps the largest difference is in price. Almost without fail, used vehicles are twice the price here. The good news on that front is the fact that vehicles tend to retain their value well, so hopefully we will be able to recoup a large percentage of our money when we sell. Another significant difference is the process of finding what you are looking for. There really aren't any used car dealerships here, and there are certainly no websites featuring thousands of vehicles only a mouse-click away. Instead we rely on the Vanuatu Daily Post classified ads, notice boards at the grocery store, and For Sale signs in the windows of trucks on the road.

I found a couple of potential suitors late this month that met our requirements (four-wheel-drive, four doors, reliable, and in good condition). I hope to be able to report that we have made a purchase in next month's e-Scrapbook.
