PLANNING IN EPAU VILLAGE

I mentioned in our last report that I had conducted a sort of interview with the Christians during last month's visit to Epau. I asked questions aimed at encouraging them to consider how they might rekindle the congregation's "fire" for the Lord, and also asked if there were programs they felt I could champion that would help them reach their spiritual goals.

Our entire family returned to Epau Village this month. I preached during the morning assembly, and after lunch I gave each of the Christians a 4-page outline of their answers and my suggestions, based on the interviews. They provided several good suggestions, and I did my best to help them understand how to enact those ideas. I emphasized that ideas and suggestions were key, but that they were going to have to work hard to make them a reality. I will continue working with the congregation in these specific areas, the end of which will hopefully be a stronger and more vibrant congregation for the Lord. Please be praying that we will reach that goal.

Titus especially enjoys our trips to the village, because it means he gets to do what boys do best - play! He ran and jumped and threw and chased and laughed until he could barely stay awake. There were three boys in particular that he was especially fond of. If they did something, he had to try. If they said something, he had to say it. VISIT TO ETAS VILLAGE





I was invited to preach in Etas the first Sunday of this month. This marked the first time that our family had the opportunity to worship in the congregation's new location. You may recall that the congregation was no longer able to meet at their previous location because the land changed hands from a local Christian to his son. The congregation is proud that they now have a place of their own for worship, study and fellowship. The Etas congregation has such great potential, and we look forward to working with them into the future.

Shawnda took Titus to the children's Bible class, which took place just before our time of worship began. She was very impressed with all that Salome has done with the kids. After singing, she pulled out a jar full of small slips of paper. One of the kids would draw one out, and had to do what it said. One example was (originally in Bislama): "What are the first five books of the Old Testament?" To which the young student responded, "Moses wrote the first five books of the Old Testament ... Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy ... these are the five books of Law." Not too shabby!! And blessings to Salome for all her hard work!

We are very proud of all the members of the Etas congregation. The church is now about 2 and half years old, which means that the "honeymoon period" has worn off and there are some common challenges they now face. We believe that they will endure and remain faithful to the end, in spite of these challenges! Please be praying for them.

UPDATE ON MAROU VILLAGE

I twice traveled to the small island of Emao this month, to worship with and encourage the brethren there. It would seem that our focused effort on this congregation is going well. Each of the Christians continue to take small steps towards a stronger faith. It is still a struggle for them to grasp the importance of their being "set apart" and "holy" as it relates to the village denomination, but they are learning and growing. They deal with challenges that are common for a small congregation (currently seven Christians), and seem determined to remain faithful to God and His word.

We will continue to meet with them each Lord's day throughout the rest of the year. In December we will begin discussing a new plan of action with them, as we prepare them to take on more and more responsibility.
