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A Trip to the Island of Tanna

Tanna island is one of the 83 islands that make up the archipelago in Vanuatu. This island boasts the world's best access to the live volcano, Yasur. This month, I went to Tanna in an effort to plant the church where it does not exist.

I organized the trip to Tanna with the help of the brethren from Etas village. Most of the Christians in Etas are originally from Tanna, which they still fondly refer to as, "home." Their love for their home island spurred them to plan and help carry out the preaching of the Gospel on their home island.

On June 3rd, Pbles, Timothy and Jimmy (all from Etas) departed by ship for Tanna. These men would prepare the way for me to come one week later to run studies daily for one week in their village. Custom on Tanna is strong and dictates that any community event, such as ours, requires permission from the chief of the village. These men went to help secure permission as well as to inform several villages of the nightly studies to be held. Chase Williams, from the Garriott Road church of Christ in Enid. OK also travelled to Vanuatu to assist this church planting effort.

From June 11th through the 18th, we ran Bible studies each night on the topic of, "The church of the Bible." This topic was well received and well attended by the Ni-Vanuatu nationals.

On average, we had 35 in attendance each night and on Sunday, June 15th, we had 107 in attendance for worship! Though the message was well received and thoughtfully considered, the people were not quite ready to commit to Christ, thus we did not plant the church on this trip. We Americans must remember that this is the first time many have heard the true message of Christ and it will take time for the Truth of His Word to penetrate their hearts. Please pray for these people who are truly seeking God's Word that they will open their hearts to the Gospel of Christ.

Eric enjoyed good class numbers and did a great job with the students. Comments from the students have been positive and we are using this term as a springboard into the third term which started on the 12th of June.


